Image copyright PA Image caption The UK Supreme Court has ruled that the government must draw up a new Brexit bill within three weeks The Speaker of the House of Commons has said the "effectively indissoluble union" between the UK and the EU must be safeguarded. John Bercow said it was "a fact of life that we cannot sever completely" and there was "no alternative" to the referendum result. The statement is thought to have been prompted by the Supreme Court's Brexit ruling. The government wants parliament's consent before a future UK-EU trade deal is agreed. In his statement, Mr Bercow said it was in the interests of both the UK and the EU "to protect this effectively indissoluble union by making sure that any arrangement between ourselves and the EU is fully agreed and fully satisfactory to each of us". The Supreme Court ruled that a UK government must be able to revoke Article 50 to halt Brexit, unless MPs approve a withdrawal agreement. BBC political correspondent Chris Mason said that the statement by Mr Bercow was intended as a message to MPs and would send "a strong signal" to Brussels. The Speaker's comments come just days after Boris Johnson said he wanted to invoke Article 50 to quit the EU on 31 October. Supreme Court Brexit ruling: what does it mean? The EU has warned it will block the UK triggering Article 50 to start its exit process unless MPs back the prime minister's plan. The government has indicated it plans to press ahead with a referendum on the deal agreed in Brussels. But the Brexit secretary, David Davis, told MPs the government's "intention" was to revoke Article 50 if Parliament was not satisfied with the final Brexit deal agreed. Mr Bercow's speech on Tuesday came just a day after the Supreme Court ruled Mrs May should seek Parliament's approval before triggering Article 50. The Speaker did not comment on the reasons behind the Supreme Court ruling or the implications for Tuesday's statement. 'Leave in peace' Mr Bercow said that it was a "uniform conclusion" of the House's committees that the UK would face "permanent damage"
